One of the new banners represents Alpha and Omega. They are the first and last letters of the classical Greek alphabet. In scripture we read...
“I am the Alpha and the Omega,” says the Lord God, “who is and who was and who is to come, the Almighty.” Revelation 1:8

This reminds us of God’s everlasting presence. We can be assured of God’s faithfulness by remembering what God has done in the past, pay attention to what God is doing now, and be trusting that God will be there in our uncertain future. This truth is comforting and grounding. But it takes our faith to continue to believe it when times get rough.



Ichthus

The second banner is another classic Christian symbol “ichthus.” It is an acronym in Greek that means “Jesus anointed of God , Son & Savior.”

There was great persecution by the Roman government who proclaimed Caesar as a god. So Christians proclaiming the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob and the God of the risen Christ was a crime. This symbol was used by Christians as a secret sign to identify as a Christian.
