This is the message we have heard from him and proclaim to you, that God is light and in him there is no darkness at all. 1 John 1:5 (NRSV)

I see God in light. It is written in Exodus 33 that Moses desired to experience the light of God's glory and goodness passing by and over him. Beverley Nichols wrote in his book *Sunlight on the Lawn*, "It is curious that so vague a quality as goodness, so difficult to define, should be so easy to recognize. It is like a light. I ask myself, "Can I be the light of God?" When I invite God into my life, I can shine boldly and brightly, I can ignite the same blessed spark within others that God ignites in me. This is my Lenten prayer, to be the light of God for me and others.
